JUDGE'S CHOICE OPEN HYBRID plus PON

Dend. Memoria Adrian Groffen 'Robert' - exhibited by Col Brandon





This Hybrid was originated by J. Purvis in 2010 and is a cross of:
Dend. Aussie Ira X Den. Elegant Heart.
The plant through its parents is:
50% Tetragonum,
25% Speciosum,
12.5% D. kingianum
12.5% D. bigibbum, all Australian species.
Col grows this plant cool in his green house, that is quite protected and I believe he showed it last year.

## JUDGES CHOICE OPEN SPECIES

Dendrochilum convallariaeforme – exhibited by John Costa



A very attractive species from the Philippines that grows at elevations of 300 to 900m so is regarded as a warm grower (can by grown in Sydney in intermediate conditions if protected in winter).

A small compact size epiphyte with 10cm leaves that are 2 -3 cm wide and when new are a bronzy colour. The arching inflorescence are about 8 to 10cm and carry as many as 50, 8mm flowers that are salmon tinted twisting around the inflorescence to give a spiral effect.

A 100mm pot would be a specimen plant and well worth chasing to add to your collection.

Dendrochilum cootesii 'Yeowie' - exhibited by Robert Nicol



Named in honour of Jim Cootes. Jim lives in Sydney and has spoken at our society meetings and apart from having this plant named after him has I believe 8 plants of various genera named in his honour. Jim is well known as an "expert" on plants of the Philippines.

As you would expect this species comes from the Philippines is found growing on mossy tree trunks at elevations of 1200 – 2000 metres and is a cool grower.

Cootesii has leathery dark green leaves that are about 10cm long and 3cm wide. The arching inflorescence hangs gracefully free of the foliage and the extremely beautiful flowers twist around the inflorescence resembling the tail of a rattle snake. The flowers as a base colour of cream darkening to orange / brown towards the centre. Some clones are white and yellow in colour.

## JUDGES CHOICE INTERMEDIATE

**Oncidium Twinkle** – *exhibited by Robert Nicol* 



Oncidiums are commonly referred to as "Dancing Lady" orchids. The Twinkle form is a compact growth variety that when fully grown is only 25cm high with strappy green foliage. The branching inflorescence carries an abundant of creamy white flowers each with a small orange to yellow eye have a chocolate / vanilla scent and the sprays are held clear of the foliage. Oncidium Twinkle is a cross between Onc. cheirophorum & Onc. sotoanum.

Epidendrum porpax - exhibited by John Costa



A dwarf creeping epiphyte species, from Columbia and Venezuela, that is found at elevations of 600 to 2700 metres. The read stems form mats of clustered leaves, usually on the trunks and branches of trees. The leaves are olive green but can take on a red to purple colour variation depending on the brightness of light it is grown in. If not given enough light it may not flower. A single waxy, bug like 20cm flower, arising from mature new growth has green sepals and petals with a large shiny red to brown lip, resembling a painted finger nail. These flowers can last a couple of months and can occur more than once a year.

Easily grown in a green house in Sydney it can be potted with medium to large bark or best grown mounted on tree fern or cork or grown in a shallow dish slightly mounded in the centre. Kept humid with a drier winter.

## Paph. venustum - exhibited by Jan Robinson, & Vic Petrovski



Derived from the name "Venus", the Roman Goddess of love and beauty, named for the beauty of the flower.

A native to India, Eastern Nepal to NE Bangladesh and to South Tibet, it is found on cliffs above streams and in shaded gullies rich in humus, growing as a cool terrestrial at elevations of 300 to 1600 metres.

An orchid that could be grown for its foliage alone, with slender 10 to 25cm long leaves that are 3 to 6 cm wide have the nicest light olive green back ground covered by darker blue / green checks, the underside is mottled burgundy. – (cont'd next page)

Paph. venustum (cont'd)

The single flower is very striking with a distinct green and white striped dorsal, then to spotted petals that are usually quite "hairy", and can have many distinctive colour patterns. Then it's best-known bizarre feature, the pouch which is so dominant with its "brain" like, vein pattern which can be green, yellow, white or mahogany. There are about eight variations of colour. To grow this variety of Paph. you will require heat or a very warm environment, bright light and good air circulation.





The two photos **above** were supplied by Jan Robinson. She asked the question as they are the same genus: why the difference in colour? is it lack of light, or may be the rainy summer / autumn that has affected the colour or is it genetic? I think it is just a colour variation. A wonderful Paphiopedilum to add to your collection particularly if you can acquire a few different colour forms.

# **Black Rot in Orchids**

Pest and Disease Forum

A danger to orchids any time **the weather is rainy or damp** for extended periods, black rot can quickly destroy an entire plant if left unchecked. Caused by one or both of the fungi Pythium ultimum and Phytophthora cactorum, black rot affects a wide variety of orchids. Cattleyas seem to be particularly susceptible.

# Life Cycle

The fungi that cause black rot in orchids can live only in environments where water is available to them. They consist of spores capable of independent movement, called zoospores, which swim through the water. If that water happens to be sitting on an orchid leaf, the zoospores can penetrate the plant tissue and begin the next stage in their life cycle. At this point, the fungus develops a vegetative part or mycelium consisting of hyphae (thin, thread-like tubes), which spread quickly through the affected plant tissues. Once this occurs, the visible signs of infection - small, watery, translucent spots - expand quickly and change to brown and then black. Left untreated, the affected plant or plants may infect others and will probably die themselves.

# Symptoms

When the fungus attacks seedlings, it is usually at the soil line. This can cause the little plants to topple and die, and is referred to as damping off.

In mature plants, the disease can strike at any point on the plant (leaves, pseudobulbs or roots), but often starts in new leaves or growing leads, and progresses downward through the plant until reaching the roots.

As its name implies, black rot shows up as dark blackish spots or lesions on the affected plant part. The black spot or spots enlarge rapidly and can spread throughout the plant. If allowed to reach the crown of a monopodial (single-stemmed) orchid, the rot will kill the plant. Affected leaves may turn yellow around the infected area, and the lesions themselves will be soft and exude water when pressure is applied. – (*Article cont'd next page*)

# Black Rot in Orchids - Cont'd

### Prevention

Unsterilized pots, media or water sources, as well as water splashed from affected plants nearby, are all excellent means of spreading the fungus. In addition, plants that spend time outdoors should be elevated 3 to 4 feet (90 to 120 cm) above the ground to avoid splash contamination. Do not allow your orchids' leaves to remain wet for any extended periods. Good air circulation in the growing area is key, and can help plants dry quickly after watering or rains. The addition of a fan or fans to the growing area can improve the airflow and help prevent rots. At first signs of infection, segregate all affected plants to avoid contaminating healthy plants. Finally, some growers recommend the use of a high-calcium fertilizer in the spring to help avoid black rot in new growth.

## **Mechanical Treatment**

To stop the spread of black rot in your orchid, begin with a sterile knife and cut out the diseased portion of the plant. Remove all infected plant material, taking out a small amount of healthy tissue bordering the infected area as a safety precaution. Examine the cut portion carefully. It is sometimes possible, especially in pseudobulbs, to see a brownish discoloration extending into the interior of tissue that appears healthy on the surface. In sympodial (manystemmed) plants such as a cattleya, it may be necessary to cut below the leaves and into the pseudobulb to stop the spread of the disease. If the plant is badly infected, cut into the rhizome, growth by growth, until you reach healthy tissue. For a monopodial orchid such as a vanda or phalaenopsis, remove the infected portion of the leaf, or the entire leaf if necessary, to halt the spread of the fungus before it reaches the crown. Place the plant in an area that receives good air circulation to allow the cut to dry. – (*Article cont'd next page*)

# **Chemical Treatment**

Once the infected plant parts have been removed, a fungicide should be applied to protect the remaining healthy tissue. Cinnamon is an excellent fungicide, and ground cinnamon may be applied straight from the spice jar directly to the exposed area where infected portions of the plant have been excised. First Rays Orchids also recommends mixing cinnamon with either casein-based glue (such as Elmer's) or cooking oil to form a thick paste. This paste is fairly waterproof and can be used to cover the wound.

Another poultice that was developed specifically for use on orchids is StopRot. The product contains a Bordeaux mixture in lanolin. The Bordeaux, a mixture of copper sulfate and lime, has fungicidal properties. The lanolin seals the wound to keep moisture out.

Whatever method is chosen, be sure to cover all of the exposed (cut) area with the fungicide or sealant, so that no new infection can be introduced to the open wound.

Drenching the affected plant with fungicide is also an option. Drenches of a protectant fungicide such as Truban or Terrazole are recommended if the disease is diagnosed early. For more advanced cases, a systemic fungicide such as Aliette or Subdue is more effective. Captan, Dithane M-45 and Physan 20 have also been recommended by some growers for control of black rot.

To protect seedlings against damping off, water with the fungicide of choice (at the dilution rate for seedlings specified in the product's instructions) as soon as they are de-flasked and potted in compots. Afterward, treat with a preventive fungicide at two-week intervals.
