### From the Bench in November

#### Chysis

Grow in cool forests from Mexico to Peru where there are 20 species in the Chysis genus

They grow as epiphytes on moss covered branches at elevations from 800 to 1500 metres.

The clumpy, pear shaped pseudobulbs usually have 3-5 leaves on the top. The flowers appear on a pendulous raceme.

#### Chysis bractescens - exhibited by Melissa Karayannis

This plant has short pseudobulbs and is a nice compact plant.

The flowers appear from the base of a new growth on an inflorescence that can be as long as 30cm and will hold many flowers.

As these flowers are reasonably large at 8cm they sometimes hang down. The flowers are ivory coloured with pink blushes, the lip is yellow / gold with rows of teeth or calli.

#### Chysis aurea – exhibited by John Ng

The pseudobulbs of this plant can be 20 to 60cm in length with leaves 15cm long, leaves are shed after pseudobulbs mature.

The arching inflorescence bears 8 to 15 waxy, fragrant, long lasting blooms. The flowers are cream with orange to peach outer ends on the petals and sepals. The lip is a purple and orange colour with 5 teeth like projections called calli, 3 white and 2 orange which is a distinct characteristic of the species. If the flower has only 3 calli it is Chysis tricostata.

(Note to John Ng – check number of calli as this photo is not conclusive.) Chysis must have bright defused light and good air movement. Water heavily in growth period of Spring and Summer, with a drier winter.

Best in baskets or hanging pots, to accommodate the pendulous nature of the plant.

#### **Dendrobium loddigesii -** *exhibited by Vic Petrovski*

Originating from Laos, Vietnam and China where it grows as either an epiphyte, lithophytes or terrestrial. It grows in humid, mossy forests at elevations from 1000 to 1500 metres.

In the areas it grows it has wet springs and summers and dry winters but always high humidity and good air circulation.

This is a miniature to small plant that flowers on leafless canes with a single flower to short inflorescence. The flowers are long lasting and have a sweet fragrance. The petals and sepals are lilac to pink. The lip is pink with a fringed edge and a gold throat.

A tough little plant once established, can be grown in pots or mounted but a dry winter is essential.

Vic's plant gives an excellent display and is excellently grown.

#### Bifrenaria harrisoniae - exhibited by Jan Robinson

Bifrenaria harrisoniae is a Brazilian species growing on east facing rocky cliffs at elevations of 200 to 800 metres.

The plants grow exposed in full sun and wind where their roots anchor them firmly by penetrating in cracks in the rocks and can withstand extreme temperatures from 4 to 40 deg. Celsius.

Bifrenaria have robust pseudobulbs with a single leathery leaf and long-lasting fragrant flowers. The flowers come in a variety of colours but Harrisoniae are off white to yellowish cream with a magenta lip. The alba form is almost pure white with a yellow throat on the white lip.

They will take bright light and may not flower if grown in shade and like a drier winter.

Very hardy and grown in a big variety of ways. I have heard growers say "hang them on the fence and burn the heck out of them". Others grow in deep pots but I have seen them in hanging baskets, all seem to work, so gives you plenty of room to experiment and try something new and unusual.

#### **Cymbidium madidum –** *exhibited by Rob Nicol*

Cym. madidum is one of three Australian native Cymbidiums plus two varieties: Cymbidium madidum & Cym. madidum var. leroyi. Cymbidium canaliculatum & Cym. canaliculatum var. sparkesii Cym. suave

(Note Cym. suave can be found growing in the Sutherland Shire)

Cym. madidum is a large bulky, robust and erect plant that has large strappy like green leaves growing from long egg shaped pseudobulbs that are a feature of this orchid. From the pseudobulbs are another feature of Madidum are the very long, pendulous racemes that can be 60cm or longer with about 60 widely spaced, sweet smelling blooms that are about 50mm in diameter. The flowers vary from green brown to yellow to olive brown.

Cymbidium madidum is found from Cape York Queensland to the Hasting River of Northern NSW, favouring moist areas in wet rain forests but can also be found in open forests at altitudes up to 1200metres.

These Australian native cymbidiums are worth trying to attain for your collection. Once established they are very hardy and very rewarding when in flower, aromatic and very unique.

The OSNSW had re-joined the festival and the Gardens were delighted to give the public the opportunity to see magnificent orchid displays. The orchid marque was popular with the thousands of home gardeners who attended.

Between 20 and 25 affiliated societies were expected to exhibit as well as commercial growers. The raffle prize for the exhibits was a week's cruise on Club Med 11 yacht from Noumea.

The festival was held over two weeks, and opened with a fashion parade where local fashion school students modelled their designs. On Thurs, Friday and the weekend evenings they had a supper club with Jazz. ## Pholidota chinensis

A small sized, lithophyte and epiphyte Species Orchid that is found in Vietnam, Burma, Hong Kong and Fujian, Guangdong, Guangxi, hiuzhou, Hainan, Xizang, Yunnan and Zheziang provinces of China

Growing on damp rocks near streams in shady as well as open areas or an epiphyte on rain forest trees in evergreen lowland forests or forests at elevations of 300 to 2500 meters

Pseudobulbs carrying 3, oval shaped leaves that blooms in the spring on a 15 to 30 cm long, pendulous inflorescence that arises from the top of a new growth before or as it develops the new leaves, with many, sparkling creamy white fragrant flowers arranged in a zigzag pattern along the spike and grows into a showy specimen quickly.

These orchids only flowers once a year and generally in late spring.

Because of the pendulous flowers it is well suited to hanging baskets. It is best grown under 50% shade-cloth and growing in a well-drained open bark mix.

It is an easy growing orchid that likes to be relatively dry in winter but once the new shoots appear then water it every two days.

It is a close relative of the Coelogyne and as such is often called Coelogyne pholas.

Those of you who were at last month's meeting may remember I asked our guest speaker, Jim Cootes, if he ever takes people out with him to see orchids in the wild.

His answer was an immediate and emphatic, "NO!", after which he went on to explain that he had done that once and shortly thereafter the orchids went missing. I understand his position, but I was also dying to see the *Pterostylis saxicolas* he showed in his presentation, an endangered species and one which I had never seen before. After pestering Jim as we were packing up that night, he finally caved in and said he would take me--but we had to go soon as they were almost finished flowering.

Hubby David and I met Jim at his place two days later. Jim told us he would drive—and then took us on a wild goose chase (or so it seemed anyway) until we eventually came to a bush area which we will never be able to find again. Not to worry, we don't need to go again. Because we found them!

Even though they are in the "green hood" family, there is nothing green about saxicolas. And so different from all the other Pterostylis we've seen! I was so stoked to see them.

After seeing me lay on the ground at eye level with the plants, Jim decided I was fair dinkum and took us to several other spots in his stomping ground to see more orchids. Jim even found a reason to dig out his fancy camera and take a photo (another orchid, of course!)

The three of us spent a brilliant morning together looking for orchids in the Georges River area, thanks so much, Jim!!!

*Cymbidium suave*, commonly known as the **snake orchid** or **grassy boat-lip orchid**, is a plant in the orchid family and is endemic to eastern Australia.

It is an epiphytic orchid that forms long-lasting clumps of grass-like leaves. Up to fifty crowded olive green to dark or brownish green flowers are borne on an arching flowering stem.

Of the three Australian species of *Cymbidium*, this is the only one that does not have prominent pseudobulbs.

It is found in eastern Australia, usually growing in the hollows of old or fallen, decaying trees.

*Cymbidium suave* was first formally described in 1810 by Robert Brown, who published the description in *Prodromus Florae Novae Hollandiae et Insulae Van Diemen*.

The specific epithet (*suave*) is a Latin word meaning "sweet".









### **Deciduous Dendrobiums** Orchid, Article and Photos - courtesy Gary Hodder

#### Dend. Stardust 'H&R'





Dendrobium Stardust is a hybrid whose parents are Dendrobium unicum and Dendrobium Ukon. This hybrid was created by N. Asai and was registered in 1986.

Dendrobium Stardust is an epiphyte with thin and long, divided into segments, grow quite tightly to each other, reach 50 cm in length, and not more than 1.5-2 cm in width, pseudobulbs that often have a reddish tint, hang down to a greater extent than they grow straight up.

The length of a pseudobulb depends largely on the intensity of the surrounding light; the larger the sun, the shorter they are.

The leaves are, 7.5-8 cm long shaped like a lance head; of a narrow oval shape tapering to a point at each end and 3-3.5 cm wide,

The canes become deciduous after 2-3 years.

This orchid generally blooms in the period from October right through to May. Racemes appear from internodes on the side opposite to the leaf. One peduncle has from 1 to 5 flowers.

The flowers are pale yellow to red-orange with darker (often brown) veins on the lip, about 6 cm in diameter. Duration of flowering about 4-5 weeks.

Dendrobium Stardust loves the bright sun without access to direct sunlight, so during the hot midday sun in summer grow it under 50% shade cloth to avoid burning the leaves.

The more intense the lighting, the shorter the pseudobulbs of the orchid grow. This orchid does not need the extremely high humidity of the air, During the period of new growth, this hybrid needs frequent and abundant watering.

Like all Deciduous Dendrobiums, Dendrobium Stardust needs a well-defined rest period to stimulate flowering.

It begins during the period of maturation of new pseudobulbs (that is, when a new young sprout finishes its growth, up until the new flower spikes start to appear.

Fertilizer should be not too strong generally half strength. Remember fertilize weakly - weekly.
