## From the Bench in December

#### Cuitlauzina pendula - exhibited by Jan Robinson

A species from Mexico, growing in well-lit locations, at elevations of 1400 to 2300m.

The 6cm oval pseudobulbs grow in dense clumps that become wrinkled with age, carry 2 greyish green lace shaped leaves. From the newly formed pseudobulbs leaf sheafs the pendulous inflorescence grow that can reach 30cm in length.

Opening along the inflorescence sweetly lemon scented 5cm flowers form. The flowers, usually white but can have a pinkish blush or pink streaks or spots. The kidney shaped lip is pale to bright pink has a yellow 'tooth' at the base.

Best grown in baskets to accommodate pendulous inflorescence, but I have found they really like small water well pots. They like bright light, good air movement, high humidity and let dry out between watering. They like a dry winter and spring until flowers set then plenty of water after flowers fall.

#### Maxillaria tenuifolia - exhibited by John Costa

A native to Mexico and Central America, commonly referred to as the "coconut orchid" due to its highly scented coconut flowers. Found in rain forests from sea level to 1500 metres, it grows as a medium sized epiphyte sometimes terrestrial.

The small "bulbs" that make up the stem of tenuifolia are potential plants, for propagation, as under the sheaf that encase the bulb are small roots that can be planted out to establish new plants.

Single flowering inflorescence grow from the bulbs. The flowers last about 10 days and are deep red to pale red, they have yellow spots on the sepals. The lip is pale yellow with red spots.

Can be potted, they like water well pots, or can be mounted, preferable on tree fern. They like bright light, not direct sun. Low light will produce a scraggy plant. Water every second day in spring and summer, weekly in winter give high humidity.

The green strap like foliage makes an attractive plant when not in flower. This is a must for every orchid grower, very easy to care for, has few parasite problems and the scent is fantastic.

#### Dend. officinale - exhibited by Jan Robinson

Classed as endangered species, is native to SE Asia and has been used as a medicinal plant in China and other Asian countries.

The medicine is acquired by boiling the canes to made a tea and used as an antibiotic and cancer fighting qualities as well as a rheumatism cure. The species is now endangered due to over collecting.

A small growing epiphyte or lithophytes that grows on mossy limestone rocks at elevations of 1200 to 1600 metres has short canes that are from 10 to 30cm and are deciduous in Autumn.

Flowers are a variable green / yellow with red markings on the lip. Not easy to obtain and I have only ever seen 3 or 4 plants on the show bench.

#### **Dend. Mingle's Sapphire** – *exhibited by Robert Cawley*

This is a primary hybrid registered by A. Millet in 1999.

Crossed between two Philippine species, Dendrobium gonzalesii X Dendrobium victoria reginae.

This plant produces nice long canes that become pendulous with amazing purple / blue and white flowers.

Once established this plant will give a great display that only gets better as the plant increases in size.

Can be grown in a pot but another that benefits from a water well pot but also goes great in a teak basket but keep the water up to it.

#### Lycaste cruenta – exhibited by Jan Robinson

A native to Central America growing at elevations of 1800 to 2400 metres.

A medium sized epiphyte or lithophyte, cruenta's longish oblong pseudobulbs have two spurs on top and several broad leaves.

The single flowers, triangular in shape, as the sepals are larger than the petals have a scent of spicy cinnamon to lemon or cloves.

The sepals are greenish/yellow with bright orange petals and labellum.

The flower stems come from the bottom of the pseudobulbs and can produce many from each growth.

They like high humidity, bright light and hate to dry out in growing period. After flowering they require a rest period.

#### **Tolumnias –** *exhibited by Robert Cawley*

There are about 20 species in this genus, but lately many, many hybrids have evolved to produce longer inflorescence, larger flowers and a bigger diversity and vibrancy of colours and to develop more hardy plants.

Originally from the Caribbean they grow as epiphytes and lithophytes in arid grasslands from sea level to 2000 metres. Most species are hard to keep alive for long periods.

In the wild they grow on twigs with their roots freely rambling to catch dew and rainwater then dry out in breezes.

A tip I was told by both David and John Woolfe was water early, never put to bed with wet roots.

They grow all of theirs either on mounts or in small, 40mm baskets attached to mounts with no medium.

I have now tried this method, after killing too many, and am now having success so far. Robert also follows this method with the plants (< LEFT) mounted.

## Fertilizing Orchids

There's been some discussion recently around locating accurate information on orchid fertilizing. Thanks to Wayne Turville from the now closed Australian Orchid Nursery, who has left a few basic tips on their Website after 40 years of experimenting – (CLICK ON THE LINK BELOW)

Dend. 'pink' farmerii (*Pod Parent*) + Dend. amabile (*Pollen Parent*)



Breeding orchids is the process of pollinating mature flowers to produce seeds.

Orchid flowers are a unique flower because there is not a male flower and a female flower. Orchid flowers have both male and female reproductive components in the same flower, in fact with an orchid flower you can selfpollinate the one flower by taking the pollen from the pollen sack (Column) and placing it on the stigma of the same flower. Having clean hands and using a sterilized tooth pick for pollinating ensures your breeding practice will not be ruined by fungal infection as fungal infection together with rapid temperature changes are the biggest killers of seed pods.

Once a flower has been pollinated, label the peduncles so that you know what is the cross, after several days if the pollination is successful the flower will die but the ovaries located directly behind the sepals, begins to swell and elongate to eventually become a seed pod containing thousands of seeds which are the smallest seed of any plant. The time it takes for orchid seed to mature varies from a few days to nearly a year.

Years ago, a well-known orchid grower crossed his two best purest white Kingianums. The result was all prodigies were pink. Sometimes all the recessive genera fire up together.

Many years ago, when Michael and Richard Dimon were teaching me the art of cross pollination, we crossed two of my favourite South East Asian Dendrobium species and this week I was totally surprised with the flowering of the seedling.

The species orchids were Dendrobium pink farmerii and Dendrobium amabile both pink flowers, but the result was a whitest of white flower with yellow on the labellum. *(refer to the photos above!!!)* 

This just shows you that nature is amazing and nothing is definite in the result of pollination of orchids. Once I cross pollinated two different coloured Dendrobium soft canes and produced twenty-one different coloured seedlings from the one pod!!

Being our Christmas meeting, members were provided with an overview of the order of the night, being we'll have the general business and judging, including our annual awards and trophy presentations. #### **GENERAL BUSINESS:**

**NEW BENCHING CLASSES:** It was mentioned, that members should have received a copy of the 2023 benching classes with the December Bulletin. Unfortunately, there was a minor error in the Open Species Class, and we've also included in Open Species -Coelogyninae and Species Laeliinae. The revised schedule was sent out separately to members, and will operate from tonight through to November next year.

We hope you find the changes beneficial by making some classes more competitive, and you should find it easier when choosing the right class for your plants. It was noted to members that if they had any questions, to please see one of our judging team or an experienced grower.

#### **INCREASE IN ANNUAL POINT SCORE PRIZES:**

Rhonda presented members with the following scenario which has led to a decision by Committee to increase the prize money for 2023:

When the annual point scores are calculated those members, who come first in a class in the Annual Points earn \$10. Second place getters earn \$5. In 2019 when we had 37 classes the prizes cost \$645. This year with 15 classes it cost \$280. The committee has decided to increase the amounts earned for 2023 to \$15 for first place and \$10 for second place. With the increase of classes for 2023 the prize money will only increase slightly accordingly.

### Dipodium punctatum







*Dipodium punctatum* - a leafless, tuberous, perennial, mycoheterotrophic herb. Between five and sixty pale to bright pink flowers with heavy red blotches and 20–25 mm (0.8–1 in) wide are borne on a green to blackish, hyacinth-like flowering stem 40–100 cm (20–40 in) tall. The sepals and petals are linear to elliptic or lance-shaped, 10–20 mm (0.4–0.8 in) long, 2.5–5 mm (0.1–0.2 in) wide and free from each other with their tips sometimes slightly curved backwards.

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The labellum is 12–16 mm (0.5–0.6 in) long, 5–6 mm (0.20–0.24 in) wide and has three lobes. The centre lobe has a band of pink to mauve hairs, the band narrow near the base but widening towards the tip of the lobe. Flowering occurs from November to March.

This orchid is often confused with *D. roseum* but has a narrower band of labellum hairs, darker blotches and less recurved sepals and petals.

The blotched hyacinth orchid is common in woodland and forest along the coast and ranges of New South Wales, the Australian Capital Territory and Queensland. It is also widespread in Victoria especially in the east of the state.
